BUSINESS LENDING

For the past year, lending efforts included ongoing Regional Relief and Recovery Fund loans that were part of the federal government's response to the pandemic, as well as significant lending from our traditional programs. This past year was the highest value of lending we have achieved in our nearly 40 years of operations.



Regional Relief & Recovery Fund (RRRF)

117 Regional Loans to 75 Businesses (July 2020 to June 2021)

Value of Dollars disbursed \$3,528,700

As with often happens after/during an economic crisis, there comes a surge in entrepreneurship, and we certainly saw that in 2021-2022. We delivered business coaching, advisory services and/or loans to 106 businesses over the past year.




JOBS

The supports this past year affected all sectors, all industries, and all types of businesses. A key Strategic Goal for our organization is the economic empowerment of women entrepreneurs and we had many opportunities to support and assist this group, particularly through our Project Gazelle.

STRATEGIC ROADMAP

How is our Progress?

Our 2021-2024 Strategic Plan outlines 4 key Strategic Goals and the activities to support those initiatives. Overall, we continue to see measurable success against our targets.





GOAL #1 – Act as a pathfinder in support of entrepreneurs

Yes, we do this everyday! A few things we've completed specifically include:

- Make Connections: Improved access to online resources through our website
 re-design and our collaborative project with the Business Link to have access to
 some of their resources
- **Create Awareness:** promotional messaging has been provided semi-annually to our Board so they can better spread the word about our programs and services directly to our communities
- Enhanced Business Advisory Services: provide enhanced services to 12 clients to December 2022. Progress to date is that we have 6 clients completed and 6 clients in progress. Additionally, we have taken on the Digital Literacy program for entrepreneurs in Saskatchewan which also includes enhanced services to 4 additional current clients.



GOAL #2 – Support the economic empowerment of women entrepreneurs

Our office worked with 76 women entrepreneurs this past year and provided loans to 14.

• Activate Women Entrepreneurs: through our Project Gazelle we have created 6 incubators, introduced entrepreneurship to 5,225 women, with 3,523 women served and 1,702 started on the path to owning their own business. We are heading into our final year of this project.





GOAL #3 – Ensure access to capital that meets the needs of our regional entrepreneurs

A few things we've completed specifically include:

- Accessible Loan Program: worked on the creation of the Smarter Small Business program to be implemented in 2022-2023; continued to disburse the RRRF loans
- Access to Capital: increase the opportunities for our clients to earn revenue by providing online selling platforms. Currently have 18 clients using at least one of our online platforms – www.albertaimarket.com or www.thegazelle.ca



GOAL #4 – To establish ourselves as a collaborative partner in community economic development

- **Be Involved:** implement projects that support women, youth, those with disabilities, indigenous, or newcomers. Our target is to have 3 such projects on the go and in reality we have 7 that meet these target groups
- Be Involved: ensure we have at least one project based within our Saskatchewan region, which we were able to do through our Digital Literacy, Self Employment program, and completing a marketing campaign with the RM of Wilton.
- Be Involved: ensure that every project or initiative we undertake involves at least one other community partner. In 2021-2022 this was achieved with 100% success rate.
